

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Social Distance; Spiritual Closeness.

How are you? It's a question many of us are asked, and maybe in the past without even thinking we answer with: 'Good – how are you?'

The circumstances we are currently living through, have a dramatic impact on our lives with many of our routines turned upside down. Activities we have taken for granted, like going to the gym or cinema and enjoying a meal in restaurant, or even getting our haircut, are suddenly no longer possible. Across our congregations, brothers and sisters are having to deal with new challenges and in some cases, some very serious problems with health; worry over loved ones; losing jobs; being alone; loss of schooling and uncertain futures.

"Now I am no longer in the world, but these are in the world, and I come to You. Holy Father, keep through Your name those whom you have given Me, that they may be one as We are." John 17:11.

He also was in the world and understands our hardships, worries and concerns. The above verse is a plea to God that we can be kept in His love.

Keep through your name.

Let us never forget the Lord Jesus Himself pleads on our behalf, that we can feel personally connected to God. Even though we are passing through hard times; we can nonetheless experience that God is with us.

Those whom you have given me.

We belong to the Lord Jesus, who loves our souls, and He promises to be with us in all our circumstances, including our trials and burdens. He will always be at our side comforting, encouraging and guiding. Let us trust in Him.

Do so out of a concern for our brother and sister and spend time to listen carefully and to pray for and with each other. We are loved by God and we love one another.
