Interview

With Sister Lisa Bates; essential worker.

Tell us a little about yourself.

I was born into the New Apostolic faith. Mum, who was from Germany, testified to Dad who was later adopted and sealed. I remember as a young child walking into town to get the bus to Bradford congregation where Priest Salt was the rector. At the age of twelve we moved to Gloucester and attended services in a rented room, which wasn't at all like the lovely church building we have there today. I moved to Birmingham when I returned from living overseas and now attend the Birmingham congregation. >



> As an adult, I lived in Germany for seven years where I married a British soldier. We also lived in Hong Kong for two years. I loved my time there.

Sadly, my sister Kathleen Cole passed away from cancer at the age of 47, which was a difficult time for me. She would do anything for anybody and always put others first. Kathleen was a member of the Gloucester congregation. In those days we had two services on a Sunday, and she used to cook a meal for the ministers who visited the congregation. She also took the Sunday school and did the flower decoration for the altar.

Where do you work and what do you do?

I work at Birmingham City Hospital as a Theatre Support Assistant. This involves meeting the patients and going through checks and questionnaires with them. When in theatre my main role is to support the Scrub Nurse by having the instruments and equipment ready for use.

There are ups and downs in the role as you can imagine, but I can honestly say I love my job because I feel I am helping people. It is lovely to see patients come out and recover from their operation. I also love watching the operation, which is fascinating, and the human body is amazing.

You do, however, need a sense of humour and I work together with a great team of doctors and nurses.

What is your outlook on life?

Life is a wonderful gift from God, which should be enjoyed. It is too short to get stressed by it. I am also very thankful for my faith which gives me a goal and purpose in life.

My favourite hymn is, 'Beyond where clouds no more appear,' because I know I have a home I will go to, but not yet because I have a grandchild I want to see grow up!

Any final thoughts?

I just want to thank our Bishop David Middleton who has kept me going through this difficult period with his 'Thought for the Day.' These morning sessions have helped me so much and I urge anybody to listen in; it's food for the soul.

Interview With Robert and Rhoda Anderson.

Who and what you do you miss?

We miss seeing everyone in the congregation, our Tuesday outings to the Silver Cinema and for Robert, not being able to get to the gym and get out with his camera.

Any observations about each other now that you are in lockdown?

Robert is now multi-tasking watching a series on T.V. at the same time as doing a photography tutorial with a headset on! He says it's given him an insight to what it will be like when I retire and stay at home every day. Hopefully we can get out and about by then.
