Foreword

Dear brothers and sisters

I am very happy to see that progress in the easing of restrictions continues, and I take the opportunity to provide a brief update on the status of opening congregations in the UK and Ireland.

Our congregations in Brighton, Camberley, Corby and London Central, together with our congregation on the Isle of Man, have now been open for a few weeks. This has enabled a few of our brethren to physically attend divine services and for us to learn valuable lessons in doing this in a covid compliant and safe way.

Our property team has been delayed in completing the necessary safety checks and risk assessments of additional buildings that we had hoped to open. This is due to unforeseen challenges with the on-going major renovation work to the Birmingham church which has required the team's full attention. If the weather permits the remaining outside work to the church will be completed within the next three to four weeks freeing up the team to make further buildings ready.

We have also had mixed responses from the various halls and rooms we hire in both the UK and in Ireland. In several cases, they are not available for hire until after restrictions are lifted, or they have covid policies which would be very hard for us to comply with. Due to this, my expectation is that the vast majority of congregations using rented accommodation will return after restrictions are lifted. In the meantime, please do contact your rector if you are willing to help as a marshal, usher or as part of a cleaning team. We need these local teams in place before we can open, and I suspect this may well be required beyond the end of June.

I know that there is a great longing to return to church but that there is also a concern that this can be done safely. I therefore, together with you, wait as patiently as I can for restrictions to be lifted and look forward to when we can once again enjoy a divine service together and worship in our accustomed way.
